## Message from the National Director

2020 proved to be a challenging but productive year. We served over 100,000 families and communities.

With your support and encouragement, Habitat Cambodia made immediate adjustments and steps to respond to the realities of COVID19. We implemented cost-effectiveness strategies - adapted remote work protocols; downsized our office and our staff; moved to e-banking and digitalization; trained partners and staff on COVID-19 preventive and protection measures; and strengthened our homeowner build programs.

Habitat Cambodia's programs and projects align with prevention and protection strategies against COVID-19, especially those focused on vulnerable families and communities.

Prevention and protection guidance, such as staying at home, safe distancing, and frequent handwashing, has become a privilege for these vulnerable communities. As the saying goes, "with every challenge comes an opportunity." Here in Habitat for Humanity Cambodia, we see these challenges as an opportunity to strengthen our mission, build homes and communities, and support recovery and resiliency efforts to recover from the pandemic's economic and social shocks.

We have doubled down our efforts to build our community PASSA group's capacity to be well-prepared and resilient to emergencies. Also, we increased investments in the provision of WASH training and facilities at the household and community level that are essential COVID-19 preventive measures.

Our committed and driven staff and partners are putting the community they serve at their heart. While COVID-19 made this year unprecedented and unpredictable still, one thing we are confident of is how this year reminds all of us how housing remains a front-line defense for the families and communities we serve. Our government partners continue to shower us with trust as they provided over 30,000 square meters of land for social housing. A group of donors and volunteers who could not travel to Cambodia generously provided us funds to scale up our urban resiliency program to other cities.

In FY21, we encourage you to journey with us as we embark on redesigned projects that will help build homes and communities that are platforms not only for health recovery but for economic recovery. Our vulnerability to resiliency strategy is focused on tapping the strengths and creativity of our home partner households and communities to recover from the losses they experienced in FY20. We have broadened our urban resiliency program to cover Phnom Penh, Siem Reap, and Battambang informal urban settlements to work on how they could improve their resiliency more. Strengthened partnership and expanded operations into Tboung Khmum and Kampong Speu.

We are grateful for the generous support you have given us. Our sincere hope is that together we continue to serve more families and communities in Cambodia. As we have found out during this pandemic, more needs to be done to pave the road to a sustainable and lasting recovery. A home remains a platform where people could start economic recovery. With a little more support and encouragement, we could build on their strengths and assets to prosper and flourish.

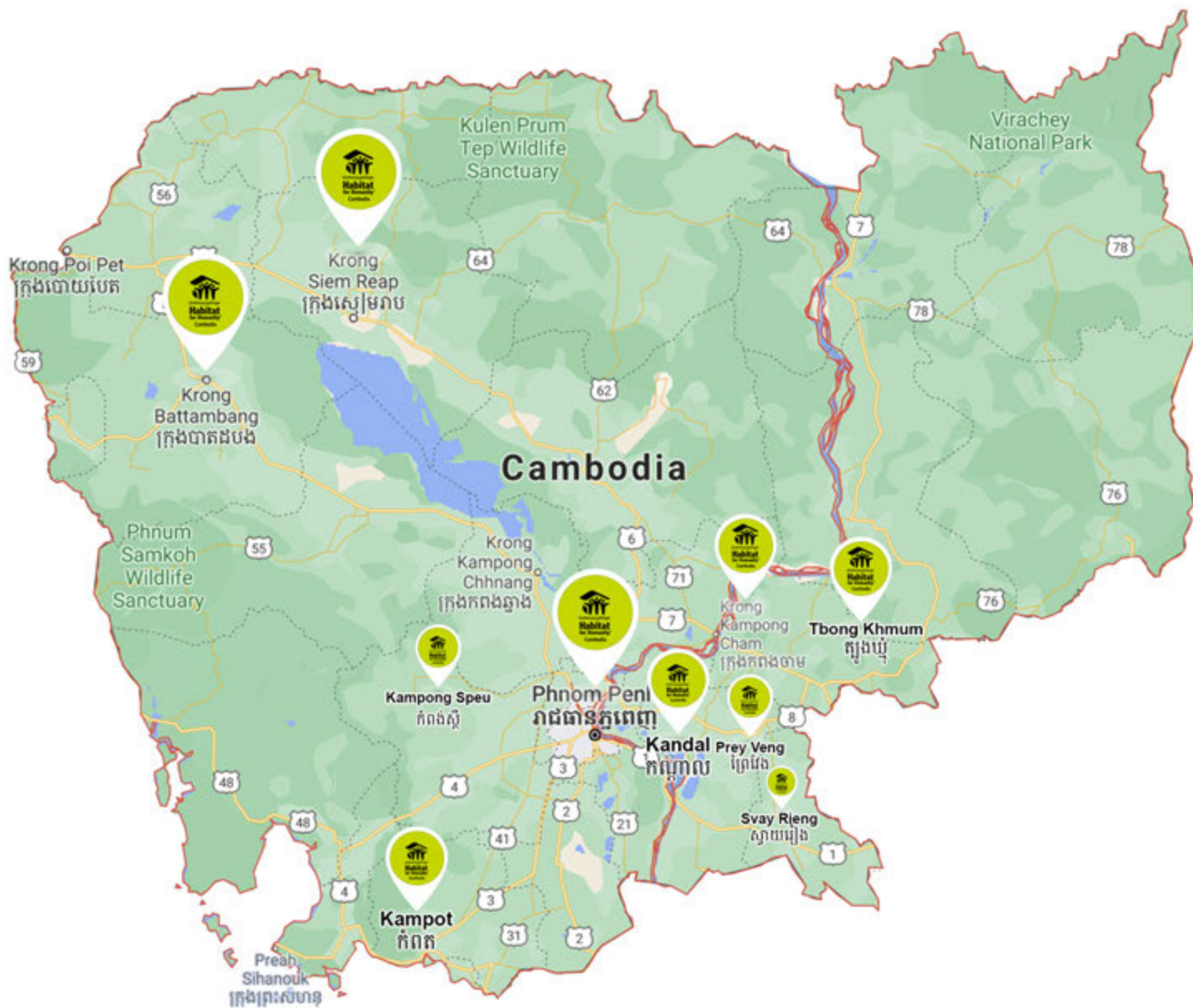

Habitat Cambodia provides technical expertise including safe and affordable house designs as well as water and sanitation programs, and an innovative approach to housing combining market development, housing finance and housing support services; advocacy for secure land tenure; and pro-poor housing solutions. Habitat Cambodia takes a more holistic approach to housing and works with partners in helping informal settlers gain access to secure tenure under the local government's social land concession scheme. Technical expertise is provided to micro-finance institutions and low-income families in constructing good-quality and affordable homes.

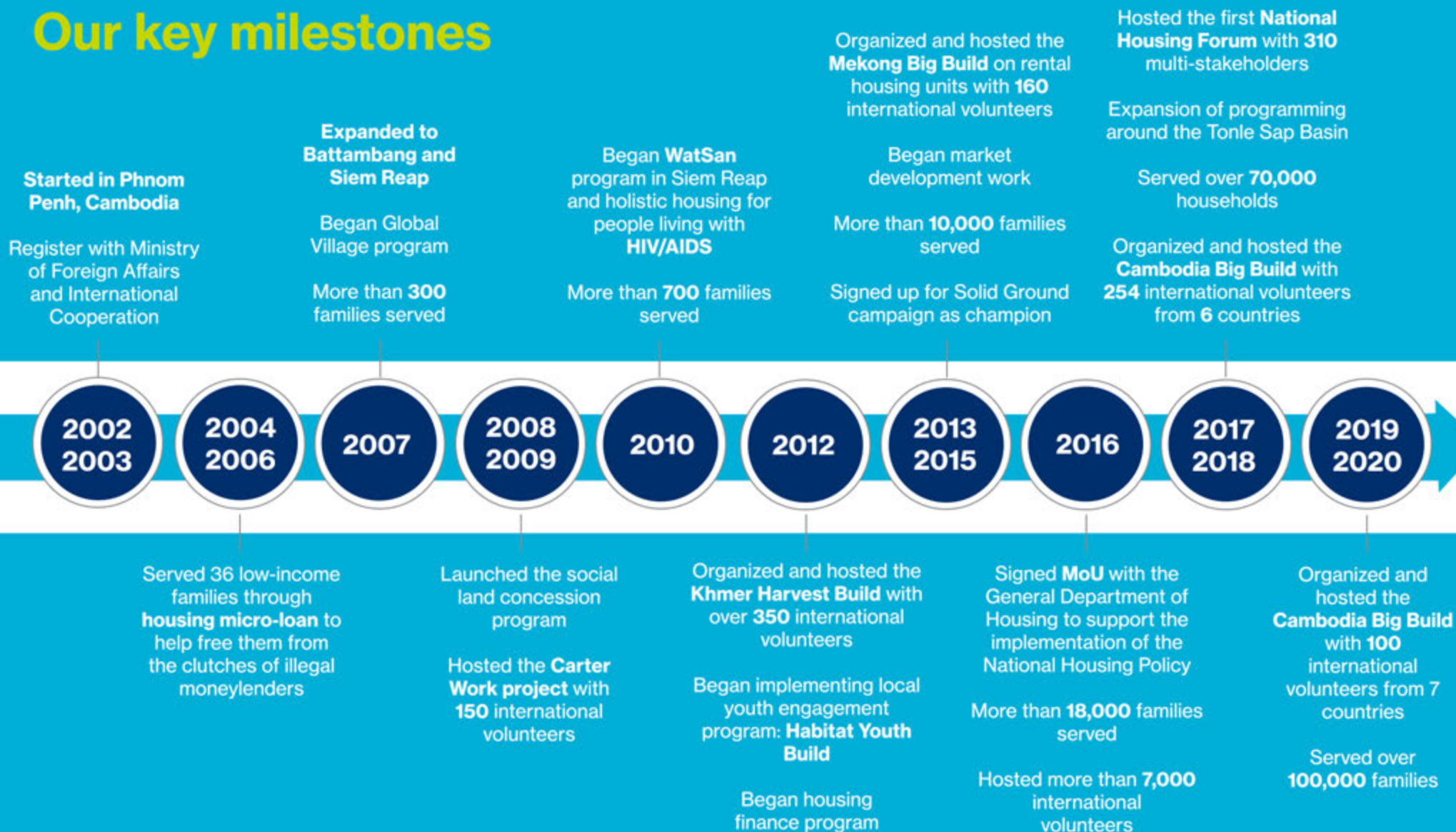

# Stay Home, Stay Fulfilled

## COVID-19 and Responses

Habitat for Humanity Cambodia, like you and many other organizations, faces new challenges. We prioritize the health, safety and well-being of our staff, volunteers, partners, the communities and people we serve. Now, more than ever, we need to quickly adapt to these unprecedented circumstances so that we may continue to serve our communities as best as we can.

### Immediate adjustments and changes to respond to the realities and impact of COVID-19

- Homeowner built, is one strategy (encouraging homeowners to do purchase materials and labour in the community where they live); Revision of sweat equity requirements for the safety of vulnerable families; explore the development of locally available and affordable PPEs - construction face shield, disinfectants for tools and remote training of skilled workers; increased social safeguards awareness of staff (i.e., child protection and preventing sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment).
- Provided training on COVID-19 prevention and how to use the social network to homeowners, skilled workers and relevant people
- Provided personal protective equipment to the skilled workers to use
- Using social media to monitor the sites and skilled workers can share the progress and photos of all activities from the build sites
- Collaborate with local authority and NGO partners to support COVID-19 prevention and monitor construction quality at the sites

### Key measures that we undertook to ensure safety of partners and staff:

- Established a COVID-19 task force team
- Developed COVID-19/Infectious Diseases Preparedness and Response Plan
- Developed the checklist to do the assessment and monitor the site and a protocol that covers pre-construction, during and post-construction in coordination with the area office







# Front Line Support

For 17 years, Habitat Cambodia has worked in Phnom Penh, Siem Reap, Battambang, Kandal, Tbong Khmom, Kampot to provide holistic housing solutions and secure land tenure for vulnerable groups such as poor people, women head of the household, informal settlers, those living with AIDS or disabilities, older persons, and orphans.

With the spread of COVID-19, families are facing both a health crisis and an economic crisis. Housing stability and secure land tenure is critical during this time especially for the most vulnerable - children, women, elderly, differently abled, refugees, informal settlement dwellers, indigenous groups, and others. Without a secure place to call home, it's extremely difficult to shelter in place, self-quarantine or regularly wash your hands.

At a time when everyone is advised to stay at home to prevent the spread of the COVID-19, those without a home have fewer places to go more than ever.

# A Base for Health Recovery

## Srey Ny's Story

"My old house brings back the memory of hard times we have endured." Said Srey Ny. "During the rainy season, the water would pour into our family home because it was damaged and the roof not properly sealed. The rainwater also brought along feared centipede or snakes into our house. Fortunately, Habitat Cambodia has provided us a decent housing. With our current safe and strong house, we are no longer worried and terrified of flooding and water leaks. Now, we sometimes fall asleep without realizing it was raining outside. I am also less worried about my kids' safety if it was raining," said Srey Ny.

Srey Ny said that she faced many financial issues if she was still living in the old house. "COVID-19 has hugely affected my daily business; I could no longer sell my vegetables for a higher price. Besides from my small business, I also collect wide leafy vegetables around my village which I could earn around 5USD per day. Now that I have a safe house of my own, I am planning to grow more vegetables and raise more chickens."

As a single mother, who has been raising her five children on her own after her husband's passing, Srey Ny has one main wish, and that is to witness all her children pursuing higher education. She expressed, "I believe that education can change their life, so I am committed to doing anything to support their future path; I do not want them to struggle as I am now."

# A Base for Economic Recovery

## Chariya's Story

Chariya, 33, and her husband, Boun, 31, live in a Tbeng Lech village located 40 km away from Siem Reap town. Chariya is a housewife looking after their three children at home. Boun is a construction worker based in Siem Reap town who goes home once or twice every week.

**“We got a new and stronger house, which we always dreamed of. I and especially my kids love this house very much. We will not get wet and concerned anymore during the rain, strong wind, or even when my husband goes to work far from home. For the first time, I have a house that is lockable and feels a lot more secure. The house also came with a toilet which we never had. This house brings me hope for my life and my kids. Now, my kids finally have a proper place their study.”** – said Chariya.

Besides the housing support, Chariya's family also received training on home maintenance, financial literacy, livelihood skill, and initial micro-grant to start up a small business. With a grant of US\$132.50, Chariya and Boun started growing many kinds of plants, including parsley, eggplant, choy sum, lemongrass, turmeric ...etc and raising some chickens. Chariya committed to taking care of her vegetables and chicken as it provided a good income source for her family.

**“With a new home, livelihood trainings and a micro-grant support that I received from Habitat Cambodia, it is now helping my family to sustain our incomes and reduce some expenses on our daily foods, especially during this COVID-19 pandemic.”**

## Touch's Story



Touch and Lorn are not different from other people in the village. They are subsistence rice farmers. In between planting and harvest seasons, they remain economically productive by weaving baskets from grass collected from around the community. Their home garden is green with vegetables. Some goes directly into their kitchen for cooking. The others are sold to neighbors. The project has provided Touch and her family a decent home with hope for their life, which lead to a change in their livelihoods. With grant support of US\$150, they have upgraded their vegetable garden around their house and raise more chickens.

“Living in my new house makes me and my family feel safe and more comfortable. Besides, we have learned a lot from the provided training. During this COVID-19, it's a challenge for my family to go to work outside, but we have more tasks to do around our house now. We will continue to do it better, and we will do our best to support our son to go to school for his future.” ”

## Creating Safe Spaces for Urban Poor Women and Girls

“ At 6 pm every night, the solar streetlights are automatically turned on. Before, it was so dark at night in my community, and we have difficulties traveling around, especially for women and girls. When it was dark, we feel unsafe as people keep losing their stuff. We have received 3 PASSA training in our community and a grant for the solar light and electricity poles installation from Habitat Cambodia. The electricity poles that we have installed are necessary, as the cable is falling everywhere, which can cause a fire or disaster to the whole community. When we first asked for the community's contribution and submitted the proposal to Habitat Cambodia, people in the community did not understand why we need to do all these activities. I asked them to come outside and look at those electricity cables' situations and explained to them, then they begin to understand and are willing to contribute. They are happily supporting us when they know that solar lights are also installing aside from the electricity poles. We have 14 poles in my community, inside and outside the villages. When we have light, we have security. When the public electricity is cut off, people from other villages always came to enjoy our community. It was bright everywhere from the solar lights in our communities, and we all are so happy with these achievements. ”



## Creating Safe Spaces for Urban Poor Elderly

“A renovated road and solar lights installed in our community with the community group's support have improved the way we are living here. Before, this road is difficult to travel, and during the rainy season, the water was flowing over and ruined this road. After the flood, this road became muddy, but now after the flood, we can clean it with the water, and everyone can easily travel around in our community. We also have several solar lights to light up our community from night till morning. Before, this area was dark, and there are lots of strangers in and out of this village at night time; looking from our home, we cannot recognize them. These also concerned us about the safety in our community. But now with all these solar lights, we can quickly identify the villagers and the outsiders.”

“Through the PASSA training, I have learned how to write a proposal to the authorities. We also received a grant to renovate 100m of road and sewage and install four solar poles from Habitat Cambodia and some contributions from the people in this community, including their labor. Before we have this road and sewages, it was always flooded during the rainy season. The water will remain there for around 2 to 3 months. Kids have difficulty going to school; also, the older people are difficult to travel around to buy their food. It was slippery, and the flooded water also affected their feet. Now there are many changes; we no longer have any problem with traveling on this road, no more floods here, so the travel is easier, and our health and sanitation are also getting better. With a separate waste bin in the village, people now know how to divide their wastes and pack their garbage before throwing them into the bin. As a community leader, I noticed that my community had improved a lot in living, hygiene, and sanitation. We also understand more about housing and land-related policies and laws.”

Through engagement with Habitat Cambodia's activities, youth actively involved in social actions and initiated the projects to solve community problems. Most of the youth projects were initiated by the leadership academy trainees after they graduated from the training. Youth leaders worked together with other youth to identify community challenges and define solutions and an action plan to make changes in their communities.

**Key achievements:**

- 8 youth projects were implemented, engaging 1,608 volunteers from school principals, teachers, students, monks, police officers to community people.
- 3,353 students benefited from these projects in Siem Reap, Kandal, Kampong Cham and Svay Rieng.
- 2 school buildings with 6 classrooms in each building were repainted.
- 200 trees were planted in two schools and a pagoda.
- The fences of two schools were painted in new color for 500 meters.
- The flooded area of a secondary school has filled the soil for 600 meters square.
- A library in another secondary school in Svay Rieng province was renovated, and 700 books were placed in that library. Ten classrooms of that school were redecorated with appropriate classroom materials for teaching and learning.

# Believe in myself

## Sengfu's Story

"I believed that self-leading was an essential step to strengthen my capacity and self-analysis. I am very enthusiastic with DAC model – Direction, Alignment and Commitment, this session encourages me to practice leading teamwork to build trust and responsibility, inspire commitment, and let me know different kinds of people". - said Sengfu.

Sengfu is a grade 12 student at Sisowat high school. Joined leadership academy training in June 2019; he saw this program as a fruitful opportunity for changing his life.

After graduation from leadership academy training, Sengfu utilized his knowledge to implement a youth-led community project. He started with other trainees to form a group and raise funds to do a "Value of Reading and Green Environment" campaign at Korkisom secondary school, a poor, remote school in Svay Rieng province. Sengfu and his team have identified the main challenges in the school. The library was not functional, and no books for the student to read. The plastic waste made the school environment and students more vulnerable. Sengfu worked with his team to develop a campaign plan and raised funds. With support from Habitat Cambodia's trainers and Sisowat school principal, his team had submitted the proposal to eight sponsors; among that, Habitat Cambodia and three other companies have provided the supports. The total fund-raised was US\$2,000 and some library materials.

As a result, a library was renovated and functioned, where students could read and learn more. Seven hundred books, including course books, Khmer literature books, storytelling books, novel books, technology books, etc., were placed in that library. Ten classrooms of that school were redecorated with appropriate classroom materials for teaching and learning. Fifty trees were planted there. At the same time, students understood the importance of reading and self-development through the sharing session made by Sengfu's team. More than 241 students and teachers benefited from this project.

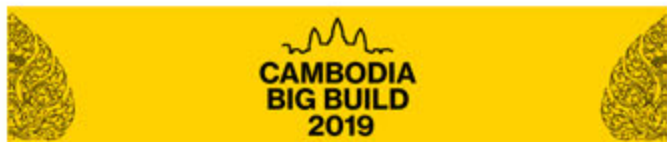

# Cambodia Big Build 2019

## One Year After



The 2019 Cambodia Big Build, held from November 17 to 22 in Siem Reap province, drew close to 100 volunteers from the United States, Canada, New Zealand, Hong Kong, Korea, Australia and Portugal. They worked alongside nine Cambodian families in building safe and decent housing in Sambour village, Pouk district. All the families had moved into their new homes on the last day of the build.

The bonds that were developed during the week-long special build continue as families create better lives in safe, secure homes. As Bernadette Bolo-Duthy, Habitat for Humanity Cambodia's national director, noted at the opening ceremony: "Aside from building homes, let's also remember to build relationships."

The volunteers' efforts were recognized by Ly Samrith, Siem Reap's deputy governor. By partnering with the families to build new homes, the volunteers were helping to reduce the future homeowners' living expenses, he said.

Siem Reap, in the northwest of Cambodia, attracts over 1 million tourists annually to the Angkor Archaeological Park. Nonetheless, it is among the poorest provinces in Cambodia, according to a 2011 government report. Habitat for Humanity has been working in Siem Reap since 2007 to improve the lives of about 20,000 families through affordable housing, clean water and safe sanitation.







“It's the most comfortable time that we ever had...Our old house didn't even have proper 'closed' walls. I love this new house so much. It's really beautiful. We are no longer worried about rain and wind. We may not have finished school but we hope all four of our children would be able to pursue a higher education.”

“My family and I feel like we have restarted our lives all over again since we moved into this new house on the last day of the build. It has been a year since we have a decent house; we can sleep well now; we no longer need to move our kids from place to place when it rains. However, during this COVID-19 pandemic, we have some challenges as I lost my basket buyers, and my husband's construction work was suspended as they are afraid of contracting the COVID-19. My husband and I have to find more outside work to survive, leaving my children with their grandmother at home. Besides, we are also looking for fish around the village and growing more vegetables around the house to make a living and share with our neighbors. My kids love their new home, and they always keep it cleaned when we are away.”

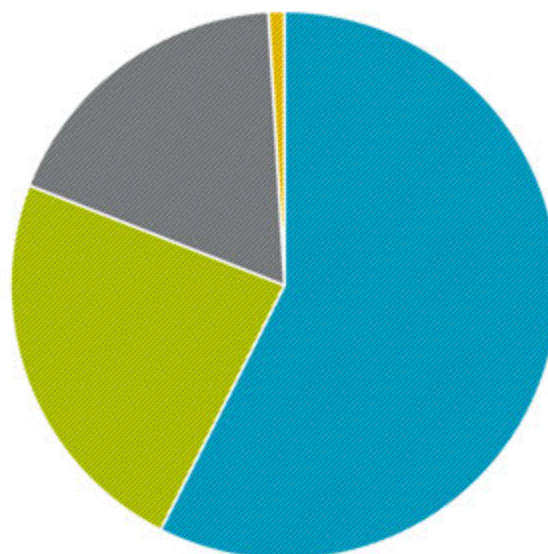

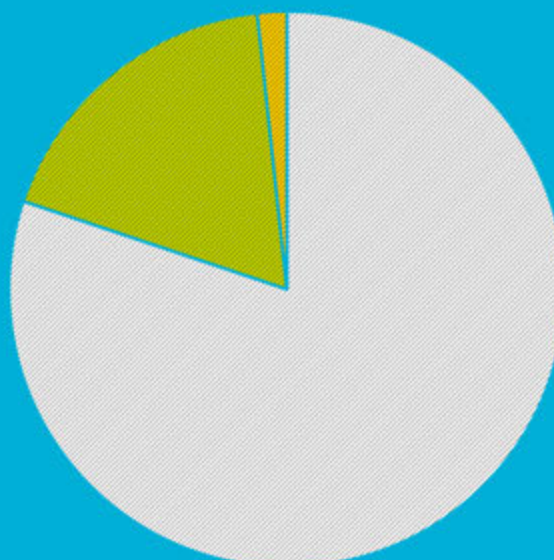
